First, I would like to thank the members who voted in the last election held in September.

The newly elected Board has held two meetings since the election. It is a goal moving forward to **restore** the positive feeling of Community at Oak Shores. We all have many friends we have made here, and it would be a shame to not put these past few difficult months behind us and move on.

Most of the time spent at the first two meetings has dealt with committee reorganization and the budget for 2016. The Board has been receiving the notes and suggestion that some of you have placed in the "Suggestion Box" located outside the office. Some have been questions and staff has responded to most with the answers. Your suggestions are appreciated and are being considered.

December is a busy month here at Oak Shores. There are at least a half a dozen fliers for different happenings going on in and around the Clubhouse. Most are noted in this issue of the Oak Leaves.

The Board will be holding a meeting, "workshop" to review and discuss ARC fees and procedures, along with our rental rules and fees. This meeting will be held during the third week in December. The meeting will be posted as soon as date is confirmed. The recommendation will be heard at the January Board meeting for member comments prior to the Board's final vote.

On a different note, the lake is currently at 18% with an elevation of 719' (800' = 100%) we are down 81'. All reports are saying the El Nino is coming in January, let's hope. We need to get the ramps under water and the docks floating! It would be nice to report a full lake in the next Oak Leaves.

Finally, I would like to thank our entire staff here at Oak Shores for all your hard work.

During the Month of October you may or may not have noticed that 99 dangerous Pine Trees were removed from our common area, prior to what we all hope is an El Nino season. The cost of this large tree removal program was \$35,000. WOW!! How can we possibly afford this??

Also because of the large project Dennis was able to negotiate reduced prices for homeowners who needed trees removed from their personal property as well.

Manager's Report

We are all hoping for rain in 2016 so that we can have a great boating season this summer. The weather people are telling us that we will have a strong El Niño and to get prepared for a lot of rain. While getting the rain is a blessing for boaters it could and will bring some challenges for the Association and you as a home owner. Our staff spends a great deal of time getting ready for normal rain but with the threat of a lot of rain like 2011 it creates a bigger challenge.

I would like to remind all of you to do the following to protect your property.

- Inspect your rain gutters to insure that they are not full of leaves and could cause water damage to your home.
- Insure that your windows are closed completely and locked. Each year as we drive around the community during and after storms we always see homes with open windows and doors.
- If you have a slope behind or above your home, please check the condition of that area. With the long term drought, we have been experiencing, the vegetation has died and the slopes will not be as stable as it should be. If we get a lot of rain you could experience some slope failure that could cause mud and rocks to hit your home or worse; having the slope erode enough to cause damage to your home.
- Examine your drains from your rain gutters to insure that they will not direct water towards the foundation of the house. If possible direct the water as far away from your home as possible.

If you see issues at your home and need some sand bags take a trip to the maintenance yard as we have sand bags and lots of sand ready for your use.

Treasure's Update

The end of the year will be here soon with the holidays consuming much of our time. This time of the year also requires that the membership receive the 2016 Proforma Operating Budget projecting income and expenses for the coming year. At its November meeting, the Board of Directors approved the recommendation of its Finance Committee to adopt the Pro forma Budget for 2016. The budget work of the Finance Committee began in the summer with discussions on various current and projected considerations such as lake level, anticipated capital and reserve spending, employee costs, and with sensitivity to fee increases, and the potential for cost savings. The Committee and Board held a joint open session workshop in October to review the proposed Budget, Reserve Study and related information. Overall assessments for 2016 will increase by \$59 per lot from \$1,671 in 2015 to \$1,730 in 2016. The increase is \$19 per lot for operations and \$40 per lot for the Reserve Fund.

After more than five years of holding fast on increases to Association dues for operations, the 2016 Budget calls for a modest \$19 annual increase per lot. The anticipated use of savings from the 2015 budget moderated the increase. The increase in dues will serve the Association appropriately, as the anticipated El Nino rainy season may bring higher lake levels and increased costs as more owners, guests and visitors enjoy activities over a longer recreational season. It also positions the Association with available carryover cash should we experience a full lake where the ability to launch and park at the main marina and west ramp is severely restricted and we incur much higher costs for parking and traffic management.

In addition, the Board opted to continue its five-year commitment to the Association to bring the funding level of its Reserves to 75% of full funding by 2018, considered fiscally prudent, by approving a \$40 annual increase per lot earmarked exclusively for the Reserve Fund. The Reserve Fund is the Association's savings that have been set aside to pay for the maintenance, repair and replacement of the Association's common and personal property. The largest components in Reserve inventory are the periodic overlay and micro-surfacing of our roads and the eventual replacement of community docks. Other Reserve inventory components include maintenance and repair of our buildings and community grounds and replacement costs for vehicles and office and other equipment. Our Reserve Funding at year-end 2015 is projected to be at 70% of full funding.

I encourage anyone who wishes to participate on the Finance Committee to contact the Office for an application. If you would rather attend its meetings, the regularly scheduled meetings occur at 10 am in the Library on the Wednesday before each month's Board Meeting. Please let your voice be heard. If you have any questions or concerns let our management, Finance Committee or Board know.

Maintenance Report for December 2015

2015 was a busy year for the maintenance staff with one major project and a calendar full of general repair and maintenance for the common areas of the community. I am sure by now you have all seen the front entrance improvements developed by a strong group of volunteers and funded by donations. The trees and plants were delivered and the maintenance staff jumped on the project with both feet. The trees got planted, the plants were installed and the drip system was put in and tested to insure that the plants would survive. We need to fix one of the ponds as it had a leak and was wasting water. The

staff repaired the pond and also installed a small stream between the two ponds. The last thing that needs to be done is to install several water falls to add to the beauty of this area.

Our entire maintenance staff is trained and certified to be able to maintain the pool which is required by the County Department of Health. Each day, including the weekends, one of the staff members inspects the water chemistry and makes the necessary adjustments. Each year the Association requires each owner to perform weed abatement on their property. Have you ever thought about how much property the Association has to perform weed abatement? Well one does know exactly how much needs to be done. JJ Johnson has been the lead on getting this job done for many years. Each year he and his crew cut weeds on approximately 100 acres Association property. This is a huge job that takes 8 to 12 weeks to finish and JJ and the staff take great pride in doing an outstanding job.

I would like to thank JJ Johnson, Josh Arthur and Kevin Farnsworth for all their hard work and dedication to the community.



DAN IN THE VINES

THE STORY BEHIND THE WINE...



Many wineries tout that their wines are handcrafted. Many wineries promote that their wines are made in an Italian style. But what if the handcrafted Italian style wines had origins to the Black Hand? Would one consider the wine to be threatening and dangerous? One should not if the wines are from The Black Hand Winery in Cambria. In fact the wines are friendly and inviting as are the owners/winemakers Tom and Terry

Banish. The tasting room is warm and comfortable and allows for a lingering experience. Just for historical information, the origins of the Black Hand date back to the early twenties in Louisiana. The name was attributed to extortion in Italian neighborhoods but was not connected to the Mafia. The Black Hand was a criminal society, but in this case it would be criminal not to taste these wines at The Black Hand Winery.

The back-story about how Tom and Terry started on the road to winemakers is just as interesting. Tom was previously in the fishery business until he and Terry had their honeymoon in the Russian River Valley. From that trip their passion followed a path of learning and developing their craft for making quality wines from their vineyards. Tom spent fifteen years at a number of prestigious wineries in the Paso region. You could say he became a "wise guy" in the art of wine making.

I have had the pleasure to enjoy their wines twice and each time I was impressed with the varietals and the quality of the wine. Of course I have settled on my favorites. Permit me to share my impressions with you. The names of the wines are also entertaining.

The 2012 Wiretap. This is blended with 75% Tempranillo & 25% Merlot. The nose offers hints of baking spices and vanilla. The legs are modest but the merlot deepens the passion purple giving the blend a pleasing appearance. The initial taste seems soft but advances to a more robust meatiness one would expect from Tempranillo. The finish is lasting without any hint of heat. On my scale of one to ten corks, I pronounce it at 8.8 corks. At \$34 per bottle it is a solid dinner wine. 97 cases.

The 2012 Alibi is a high end Bordeaux blend consisting of 60% Cab, 25% Cab Franc, and 15% Merlot and is aged in French Oak with a medium toast. This produces the French characteristics of a Bordeaux blend. This has a distinct nose of dark ripened berries without being overtly fruity and sweet. My tasting notes are of rounded fruit with some almonds, and may I even say, a hint of biscotti. I am awarding the Alibi with 9.1 corks. They offer this at \$42 @ bottle, but there is no doubt it will be an excellent performer even in five years. 100 cases made.

The 2011 Syrah Estate Reserve. This is my very personal favorite. A significant attribute is that it has been aged for 43 months in Russian Oak. This not the usual oak style, but creates a beautiful uniqueness to this Syrah. The nose is a complex of tobacco, some Italian leather, and rich plum and blackberries. From the Russian Oak the taste delivers a huge explosion of spices with hints of mild pepper. This combination ends in bringing forward the gorgeous ripe fruit but soft on the tannins. I am compelled to rate this at 9.5 corks. It is bargain at \$36 but with only 49 cases available, you must act soon.





HUM ME A FEW BARS: PART ONE

You're standing in your yard or on your patio and suddenly something passes nearby. You didn't see anything but you felt a presence and heard a buzzing sound. People in the Caribbean called them zunzun. While eight different species of hummingbirds have been sighted in San Luis Obispo County, the zunzun in Oak Shores is usually Anna's Hummingbird. Obviously, hummingbirds got their name because of the humming sound they make. A hummingbird's wings flap about 80 times per second causing feathers to vibrate and make noise. These flying jewels are captivating, vibrant, and pugnacious. They are sublimely beautiful and most have glittering, iridescent plumage. To add to their beauty some have showy tufts of feathers or plumes.

Hummingbirds are only found in the New World. When the first Europeans arrived in America and saw their first hummingbird they were fascinated and speculated that they were part insect and part bird. There are 328 hummingbird species. The smallest is the Bee Hummingbird from Cuba, and the largest is the Giant Hummingbird from South America.

Native Americans held hummingbirds in high esteem. Many of their legends explain that hummingbirds poked holes in the night sky to make stars. The Hopi and Zuni believed hummingbirds helped man by convincing the gods to bring rain. Pueblo shamans use hummingbirds as couriers to send gifts to the Great Mother who lives beneath the earth.



Anna's Hummingbirds are among the most common hummingbird on the Pacific Coast. Some people think all hummingbirds migrate and head south in the fall. Anna's Hummingbirds in coastal California, Oregon, Washington, and Vancouver Island do not migrate. So if you were thinking of taking down your hummingbird feeder, don't. Anna's will use it all winter long. Though no larger than a Ping-Pong ball and no heavier than a nickel Anna's Hummingbird is hard to miss. Male Anna's are showy and use their flashy feathering to attract females. The male has an iridescent emerald green back, a grayish breast and a dark rose-pink throat patch. Female hummingbirds are feathered to blend into the foliage when sitting on a nest. If you see a hummer around Oak Shores that has some rufous colored feathers it is not an Anna's and is most likely an Allen's hummingbird.

Fun Facts: A group of hummingbirds may be called a bouquet, a glittering, a hover, a shimmer, or a tune of hummingbirds.

Proper Disposal of Household Hazardous Waste**

Hazardous waste should NOT be disposed of in the trash or in the gutter. Hazardous waste disposed of in the trash poses a serious threat of injury to trash collection and landfill operators. This kind of waste also creates environmental problems when disposed of improperly. For these reasons, disposal of hazardous waste is regulated and improper disposal is illegal. The penalties can be substantial. Empty containers may be discarded with your trash. Hazardous waste must be disposed of on a designated drop off day at the designated location only.

Household Hazardous Waste

Drop-off Facilities

San Luis Obispo County Integrated Waste Management Agency (IWMA) operates six household hazardous waste drop-off facilities in San Luis Obispo County where residents can bring household hazardous waste. One of those sites is at Heritage Ranch behind the Community Services District Office and it is now available to residents of Oak Shores. It is only available Fridays from 12pm to 2pm. Another facility is located at the Paso Robles Landfill and it is open on Saturdays from 11am to 3pm. The maximum amount of household hazardous waste you can drop off at one time is 15 gallons or 125 pounds. You can also drop off old TVs and computers. There is no charge to use these facilities.

Household hazardous waste is accepted but not radioactive, medical waste such as prescription drugs or needles, or explosives. The IWMA has a separate program for proper disposal of medicine or needles. For more information please contact the IWMA at 805-782-8530.
